ONC owns a 700-acre nature preserve, Little Thicket Nature Sanctuary (LTNS), 11 miles northwest of Cleveland, TX. All members and guests are invited to attend monthly open houses.

Each time we venture outdoors to enjoy nature, we encounter something new. It might be an insect, a plant, a snake, a bird, or any other of the myriad species that inhabit our natural world. This back page is usually devoted to highlighting our encounters. If you find an interesting species and would like to share, please send your photo with a brief description to the editor. We hope you will learn something here and also be encouraged to spend more time exploring!



• Larva, White-lined Tussock

Moth (Orgyia leucostigma) — A fairly common caterpillar in Eastern forests is this tussock larva. It's easily recognized by the red head (top of photo) and mid-dorsal white to yellow tufts. This guy is not a picky eater and feeds on a variety of hardwoods and woody plants. Some folks might have an allergic reaction if the hairs come into contact with sensitive skin, so beware and do not touch!



1 Larvae, Live Oak Metria

(Metria amelia) — these caterpillars are well camouflaged on an oak tree in The Cove at LTNS. Although commonly named after the Live Oak tree, this species probably feeds on various other oak trees. It was found at LTNS on a Water Oak. This moth is in a family known as Wavy-lined Owlets, and the adult does have beautiful patterning in the wings. The adult has not yet been recorded at LTNS, but we keep looking!
